At Portland Estates Elementary, we continue to strive to improve student learning and enable our students to achieve their full potential. If your child must have such products at school, please ensure that they are scent free.

Well winter is in full swing! We have really been experiencing the cold and snowy weather of winter! The winter months will continue to provide inconsistent weather conditions. Please help us to ensure students are prepared for the outdoors by having them come to school with appropriate gear for outside. We will always monitor the weather and ensure that decisions about sending students outside are made with their safety in mind. Students do go outside for recess and lunch each day (unless it is raining heavily or exceptionally cold), so please make sure your little ones have hats, scarves, mittens/gloves and warm outerwear.

- Proof of home address (a recently dated official government or utility document with your current address that includes your name and date, such as water bill, power bill, internet bill, home fuel bill, a tax receipt, property assessment or a mortgage contract); and


African Heritage Month 2025 is an opportunity to educate, inspire, and celebrate the richness of African heritage in Nova Scotia every day.



Reminder: February 17 is Heritage Day

Heritage Day 2025 honours the late Nora Madeline Bernard. From Millbrook First Nation, she was a Mi'kmaq activist who fought for her community and First Nations people across Canada.

Ms. Bernard played a key role in getting justice, recognition, and compensation for survivors of the Canadian Indian Residential School system. As a survivor of the system herself, she founded and became president of the Shubenacadie Indian Residential School Association in 1987. She then started a class-action lawsuit for the survivors, which inspired others across the country to do the same, leading to the largest class-action lawsuit in Canadian history.

Family Literacy Week provided us with an ideal opportunity to communicate with you, our students' families, about the importance of at-home reading and engaging with children in literacy-related activities.


To support you in your at-home reading journey, we are sharing a simple infographic with tips for families, as well as links to useful resources for caregivers.



At-home reading tips for caregivers



Look at your child's books with them. Discuss the pictures and build vocabulary by talking about new words.





Make reading aloud a regular part of your routine – just 15 minutes each day can make a big difference in raising a reader.



Discuss examples that help them relate to what they're reading. Connect the story to your child's world.



Connect with your child's teacher for more suggestions on how to support reading at home.



Supporting reading at home can be rewarding, but also challenging. Students may excel at reading, but some may require extra support, whether it be extra practice, or trying different

strategies to help address a learning disability. There are various resources online where parents can access tools to help their child decode words, build fluency and encourage active reading overall. All About Reading not only provides resources to support decoding strategies, but also provides parents with a readiness checklist so that they can see what level their child is at. Raz-Kids has levelled readers and is a program that is familiar to a lot of primary aged students. Some will have an account through school, but individual annual memberships are also available for purchase. Teach Your Monster to Read is a game that focuses on sounds and words to support early readers and is available as an app on Android and Apple devices.

Red Means Stop! School Bus Safety Reminder

HRCE has recorded numerous school bus stop-arm violations in Halifax Regional Municipality since the beginning of the school year. This means that motorists have failed to stop for a bus when its red lights were flashing and the stop sign was extended or when students are loading or offloading. This poses a serious risk to children and families who may be crossing the road to enter or exit the bus. Drivers may also face a fine and demerit points if caught by police.

Help us spread the word to remind drivers (including cyclists) that it is illegal to drive past a school bus when they see its red lights flashing and stop-arm extended.

Drivers must slow down and prepare to stop in all directions when they see flashing lights – either amber or red in colour – on a school bus. This means the bus is planning to stop or may have already.

Here are some safety tips from Safety Services Nova Scotia to keep in mind when waiting for or exiting the bus:

- Stand back from the edge of the road.
- Line up in single file when you see the bus coming.
- Wait for the bus to come to a complete stop.
- Walk, never run.

• Make sure the bus driver sees you if you are crossing the road. Take 10 giant steps in front of the bus before crossing.

- Wait for the bus driver to signal that it is okay to cross.
- Always look both ways before crossing the road and listen for traffic.
- Never cross the road from behind the bus.

Inclement Weather

The Halifax Regional Centre for Education takes great care when making the decision to cancel schools and/or busses in the event of severe or inclement weather. Decisions on school closures and/or bus cancellations are posted on the board's website at <u>www.hrce.ca</u>, on Twitter at <u>www.twitter.com/HRCE_NS</u>, recorded at 902-464-INFO (4636) and communicated to all local radio stations. Families can also receive notice of school and bus cancellations by e-mail or text message by following the link on the front page (left side) of the HRCE website. The weather in Nova Scotia is unpredictable so it's always a good idea for families to have a back-up plan for child care when school is cancelled. Delayed Opening due to Inclement Weather -If weather conditions warrant, the Halifax Regional Centre for Education could implement a delayed opening. Delayed openings would be considered when a severe weather event has concluded but snow clearing or other operations require additional time. Delayed opening may also be considered when the physical plant is experiencing an issue such as a power outage or loss of water and additional time is required to prepare the school to open. If this was to occur, school and preprimary would be delayed by two hours. At Portland Estates school, this means school would start at **11:00 am**. If the Special Needs Bus is operating, the expectation will be that students are picked up two hours later than their regularly assigned time pending any weather-related delays. Our lunch, afternoon schedule and dismissal times will remain at their regularly scheduled times. The Excel program will be cancelled for the morning only.

Breakfast Program- The Breakfast Program at PEES is up and running. Breakfast to Go is available to students everyday of the week. All homeroom classes have Breakfast snack bins so food is available to all students throughout the day. We thank Mrs. Graham and Mrs. Hartlin for keeping our bins stocked daily.

Power Outages – The HRCE has a Power Outage Protocol. Power Outages are inevitable and when they occur they do not mean an early dismissal, often the schools remain open until Power is restored. For Portland Estates Elementary School it means that once our Emergency lighting goes (shortly after the thirty minute mark), we have lanterns posted in the main washrooms on both floor. **Our Public Address system (PA) is unavailable as well as our telephone system so do not try to contact the school instead please monitor the situation on the HRCE website or Twitter feed.** The HRCE central office will send out an Alert email if they decide to close school early and staff will contact parents/guardians using their own personal devices if possible.

HRCE Wind Chill Protocol

If the wind chill is... then...

0°C to –20°C We take care in deciding whether it is appropriate to send students outside

-21°C to -27°C- We seriously consider whether it is appropriate to send students outside below

-27°C – We do not send students outside

A Way for Families to Report Student Absences

One of our greatest priorities is ensuring all students arrive to school safely each day.

Parents/guardians of students who attend our school have the option to report their child's absence in advance using a toll-free number, the PowerSchool Parent Portal or an app!

SchoolMessenger SafeArrival – an absence management system that improves student safety and makes it easy for families to inform their child's school if they will be away – powers all three of these options.
