

**Celebrating achievements:** Black Excellence Day provides an opportunity to celebrate the achievements, contributions, and successes of Black individuals within the community. It highlights the talent and accomplishments within the Black community, ensuring that Black students have an opportunity to highlight all their positive contributions within the education system.

**Promoting equity and inclusion:** Recognizing Black Excellence fosters a culture of equity and inclusion within schools. It sends a message that all students, regardless of their background, have the potential to excel and make valuable contributions to society. By celebrating diversity and promoting inclusivity, schools create a more welcoming and supportive environment for all students.

**Education and awareness:** Black Excellence Day serves as an educational opportunity to raise awareness about the rich history, culture, and achievements of Black people. 

#### Homework Hub: Finish the year off strong!


Did you know your student has access to Homework Hub? Finish the year off strong with the help of experienced tutors!

## **Registration:**

I know that it is difficult to believe that we are already looking at our student enrollment and staffing for next year. We have registered many new Pre-Primaries, Primaries and new to the area students as well. It is very important that we have accurate numbers so that we hire the correct number of teachers. If you have not yet registered your child for Pre-Primary or Primary, or if you know that your child or children will not be attending Portland Estates Elementary school in the Fall of 2025, please contact Mrs. Henman-Poirier at 902-433-7100.

**Playground:** During the school day we ask families not to arrive too early to school. Students should arrive between 8:40 and 8:50 am to be ready for instruction to start promptly at 9:00am. Excel has the use of the playground afterschool in an agreement between the HRCE and the HRM. Please be cognizant of this fact.

**Volunteers:** We recognize our responsibly to ensure that all students attending our schools are protected by taking reasonable precautions to screen volunteers who may be working or supervising students. In accordance with the HRCE's Student Protection Policy, prior to volunteering with the HRCE, all volunteers will provide:

- 1. Completed Child Abuse Registry check
- 2. A certified and true copy of a Criminal Records Check with Vulnerable Sector check.

Child Abuse Registry Search and Criminal Records Check with Vulnerable Sector must be issued within the three months preceding being given to the school and must be updated every three years.

# A Way for Families to Report Student Absences

One of our greatest priorities is ensuring all students arrive to school safely each day.

Parents/guardians of students who attend our school have the option to report their child's absence in advance using a toll-free number, the PowerSchool Parent Portal or an app!

SchoolMessenger SafeArrival – an absence management system that improves student safety and makes it easy for families to inform their child's school if they will be away – powers all three of these options.

If your child will be absent, please let us know by using one of the following methods:

# **Toll-Free Number**

Call 1-833-582-6940 to report an absence using an automated system.

# **PowerSchool Parent Portal**

### SchoolMessenger App

Download the SchoolMessenger app for Android and iOS devices and sign up using your PowerSchool username (full email address).

# Assessment:

Assessment is a critical component of teaching and learning. Ongoing assessment guides the teacher's next steps in instruction and helps learners know how they are doing in relation to the outcomes taught. One aspect of assessment is providing feedback. This helps to inform students and families on how the student is progressing and allows teachers to define student strengths, needs, and next steps in instruction. Assessment may take the form of a running record with your child or a math assessment – it might be a Google form or it may be an interview.

**Communication with staff**: Communication is key to a smooth-running operation. Regular communication is a great way to make sure that you are aware of the successes and challenges your child may be facing. Please feel free to reach out to the teacher if you have any questions.

## Did you know? Introducing TILT!

Did you know that our Technology Integration Leadership Team (TILT) works with teachers and students in Grades P-12 to support technology integration within the curriculum?

Did you know that all schools have access to different technologies used to increase student engagement and achievement, such as coding robots, 3D printers, podcasting equipment, and more?

Whether it be helping students write their own digital books, film a stop motion video, code their own virtual reality environment, or build a circuit-based interactive poster, the TILT team provides support for teachers to help students find alternative ways to demonstrating their knowledge and skills. So far this year, the TILT team has visited more than 400 classrooms!

## Measles prevention in Nova Scotia

We are sharing the following on behalf of Nova Scotia Public Health:

Measles cases are rising in Canada. Measles is a virus that spreads easily and can cause serious complications. **The best way to prevent measles is vaccination.** Nova Scotia offers free vaccines to eligible people. These can be given by primary care providers, pharmacists and Public Health.

Parents are encouraged to check their family's vaccine records and get the measles vaccine if missing doses. Check your vaccine records at vaxrecordns.nshealth.ca.

### Who should get vaccinated?

• Anyone born in or after 1970 should get **two doses** of vaccine, typically given at 12 and 18 months. If missed, children and adults can catch up for free.

• Adults born before 1970 are generally considered immune but can get a single dose if travelling.

• Infants 6-12 months old can get a single dose if travelling but still require two doses after their first birthday to complete the series.
